2025 Legislative Session At-A-Glance



Education

- KAS tracked 41 bills related to education this year
- 8 bills passed the first chamber
- 4 bills or resolutions were adopted or made into law
- 2 of these bills became law over Governor Beshear's veto
- Main themes included:
 - o DEI in education
 - New degree program options
 - Teacher recruitment & retention
 - Performance evaluations in higher education
- Bills that passed included:
 - o House Bill 4: Prohibits DEI activities in higher education
 - This bill passed over the veto of the governor
 - Senate Concurrent Resolution 43: Supports the Crisis Recovery Support Network for schools who experience traumatic events
 - o House Bill 193: Expands dual credit offerings for high schoolers
 - o House Bill 424: Removes many tenure protections in higher education
 - This bill passed over the veto of the governor

Environment & Energy

- KAS tracked 23 bills related to the environment and energy this year
- 10 bills passed the first chamber
- 6 bills or resolutions were adopted or made into law
- 2 of these bills became law over Governor Beshear's veto
- Main themes included:
 - Geoengineering
 - Nuclear power
 - Air quality regulations
 - Water regulations
 - o PFAS
- Bills that passed included:
 - House Concurrent Resolution 22: Declares that nuclear power is a clean method of providing electricity for the Commonwealth
 - House Bill 24: Changes the way soil and water conservation services are classified
 - o Senate Bill 89: Removes protections for much of Kentucky's water
 - This bill passed over the veto of the governor
 - House Bill 137: Regulates methods that are allowed to be used to enforce air pollution control requirements
 - o **Senate Bill 179**: Establishes the Nuclear Energy Development Grant Program
 - o House Bill 346: Changes the way emissions fees are allowed to be collected
 - This bill passed over the veto of the governor

Health

- KAS tracked 39 bills related to health this year
- 8 bills passed the first chamber
- 5 bills or resolutions were adopted or made into law
- 1 of these bills passed over the veto of Governor Beshear
- Main themes included:
 - Water fluoridation
 - Parkinson's disease registry
 - Regulation of women's healthcare
 - Regulation of LGBTQ+ healthcare
 - Vaccine requirements
 - Colorectal cancer screening
- Bills that passed included:
 - House Concurrent Resolution 20: Directs the Legislative Research Commission to study access to sexual assault nurse examiners
 - o Senate Bill 27: Establishes the Kentucky Parkinson's Disease Research Registry
 - Senate Resolution 32: Supports increased awareness of tick-borne diseases in Kentucky
 - House Bill 421: Requires health plans to cover colorectal cancer screening tests that are recommended by the United States Multi-Society Task Force on Colorectal Cancer
 - House Bill 495: Effectively overturns the governor's ban on conversion therapy;
 and additionally, prohibits the use of Medicaid funds on gender transition
 services
 - This bill passed over the veto of the governor

Looking Back & Looking Ahead

- KAS made 5 more statements on bills in 2025 compared to 2024
- We had a 2.2-fold increase in active participation this year 11 people in 2025 compared to only 5 in 2024!
- We ranked 59% more bills this year compared to last year an increase of 117 bills!
- KAS sent 5 action alerts to our entire membership over the 2025 legislative season
- We made direct contact with 13 legislators
- KAS hosted an updated edition of our annual advocacy training. We had 12 participants
 who made several informational one-pagers about 2025 bills. 5 people attended our Hill
 Day and met with legislators directly.
- Moving forward into 2026, we expect to see the reintroduction of bills that did not pass this year, including:
 - Water fluoridation
 - Geoengineering
 - o PFAS
 - o Regulations surrounding vaccination, women's health, and LGBTQ+ health
